SCHOOL CODE OF CONDUCT

The Westcreek Public School Code of Conduct was created to help ensure our students that our school is a safe and productive place to learn for everyone. I will review the Code of Conduct with my family so that we all understand the school expectations and procedures.

A school is a place that teaches me to be responsible, to be respectful, to be a good citizen, and to excel academically.

The Ontario Schools Code of Conduct gives clear standards of behaviour for everyone involved in schools in Ontario - students, staff, parents, volunteers, and other visitors. The standards apply on school property, on school buses, or at other school events or activities.

As a student of Westcreek Public School, I am committing to the behaviour expectations outlined in the following Code of Conduct. I am aware of the reasons for these expectations and the possible consequences for not following the code.

(7) Dress Code		
I will dress appropriately for the season. I will remove my hat when I enter the school or portable. 8) Behaviour in School and on the School Yard

I will help to make the school yard a safe place for everyone. I will avoid dangerous activities such as play fighting and throwing objects like hard balls, ice, snow, sticks rocks, etc.

I will obey the "hands off" rule at all times. I will not bully, harass, or threaten others with my words or my actions. I will not participate in behaviour that is repeated, persistent or intended to cause fear, distress or harm to someone's body, feelings, self- esteem or reputation.

I will not bring any dangerous objects to school such as lighters, matches, laser pointers, needles, firecrackers, knives (weapons of any kind), etc.

I will not ride roller blades, bikes, skateboards, scooters or roller shoes on school property.

I realize that it is strongly recommended that all electronic equipment such as cell phones, cameras, personal music devices and electronic games not be at school. If I do bring such items to school, unless instructed by the teacher, they are not to be used or visible during instructional time. In order to use such equipment, I will possess and follow the rules related to my digital license.

I will not bring anything to school that could be considered inappropriate or offensive. Everyone has the right to be safe and happy at school. By playing safely, I allow the supervisors to keep everyone safe.

Sometimes, people frighten, bully, or threaten others with their words or actions. Most people find this behaviour mean and terrible. This behaviour will not be tolerated at Westcreek Public School

I cannot respect myself if I do not respect the rights and feelings of others first.

I realize that many objects can be dangerous to others on the playground and should not be brought to school. I understand that this assists the school to maintain a safe environment which is conductive to learning.

I am aware that when valuable personal items are brought to school, the safety of these items cannot be guaranteed. I will not use these items inside or outside the school unless instructed by the teacher I will be consequenced by my teachers, or by the principal or vice-principal.

My parents may be notified.

The consequences may be a detention, an assignment, an alternate activity, or a suspension or expulsion from school. Durham D.S.B.'s Progressive Discipline policy will be followed.

I may be suspended from school if I fight on school property, or on my way to and from school.

I realize that if I use electronic devices inappropriately at school that they may be confiscated and returned to me at the end of the day. If I continue to use them inappropriately, my parents may be contacted and I will be asked not to bring them to school anymore.

<u>(9) Smoking</u>		
I will not bring cigarettes, matches, or lighters to school. Smoking is banned on school property, on field trips, and on buses, at all times, by students and adults. (10) Alcohol and Drug Use I will not have, use or misuse alcohol or illicit drugs at school at any time.	Misusing alcohol or drugs keeps me from learning and it is ILLEGAL	If I come to school under the influence of alcohol or drugs, I will be automatically suspended and the police will be called.

Please Note:

- The use of recording devices (audio/video) is not permitted unless approved by the school.
- As a result of the Safe Welcome Program, the doors of all elementary schools will be locked 10 minutes after the morning entry bell and will be unlocked at dismissal time. During the lunch hour, school doors will be unlocked. Please push the intercom at other times for entry. Please wait for students at the appropriate exit when picking up students. Any items that must be given to students need to be dropped off at the office.
- All visitors must check in at the office when entering the school.

Electronic Devices:

Technology continues to evolve, providing students with access to personal wireless technologies that are sophisticated and inexpensive such as cellular phones, smart phones, tablets, portable digital media players and recorders, gaming systems, etc. In keeping with the Freedom of Information and Privacy Act, unauthorized video or audio recording on school grounds for any purpose is prohibited. Further, the taking of photos, filming or recording at school or at a school related activity, is prohibited unless approved by DDSB staff for educational purposes. In particular, the use of cameras for filming is strictly prohibited in washrooms and change rooms. However, this is not intended to prohibit sanctioned recording of activities at events open to the general public.

Teachers embed the use of personal technology into learning opportunities for students. The DDSB supports these actions and encourages this use as it is educationally based and provides opportunities for our students to develop digital citizenship skills. It is the practice of the Durham District School Board that the use of personal electronic devices

is prohibited during the school-day on school property. Unless deemed appropriate by the school administration for educational purposes and permission is granted by staff, a student who brings a personal electronic device to school should turn it off and keep it out of sight. Personal electronic devices may be utilized off school property or in designated areas and during times assigned by the school. The Durham District School Board cannot assume the liability for lost, damaged or stolen personal electronic devices. Personal electronic devices that are used inappropriately inside of schools during the normal school day are disruptive to the teaching and learning environment. The privacy and personal dignity of others could be violated by the inappropriate use of personal electronic devices to text message, social network, and/or share digital media. In addition, activities such as personal communication, game playing and social media during class time will distract students from the teaching and learning unless it is part of the teacher's lesson design. Co-curricular programs, such as field trips and after-school events, are an extension of the classroom and the expectations for the use of personal electronic devices apply. Staff may approve the use of this technology for purposes of education and communication. During an emergency, the administration in consultation with Emergency Services, may give students permission to use personal electronic devices to contact parents or guardians.

STANDARDS OF BEHAVIOUR (Ontario Schools Code of Conduct)

The Durham District School Board and Westcreek Public School support the provincial standards of behavior which include respect, civility, responsible citizenship and physical safety. Discipline at Westcreek P.S. involves teaching students to be respectful and responsible in school. Our focus is to help students resolve the issue, learn from the experience, and develop skills to make positive and appropriate choices. We help students understand expectations and take responsibility for their behaviour. Our disciple uses progressive discipline, restorative practices, logical and realistic consequences. It is our belief that students who experience logical and realistic consequences learn that they have positive control over their lives. They make decisions and solve problems. Restorative practices ensure that when an incident happens the behavior will change and relationships will remain intact.

Suspension

(Ontario School Code of Conduct)

Depending on the mitigating factors defined in Ontario Regulation 427/07, a student may be suspended if the student commits any of the following infractions while he or she is at school. Inappropriate behaviour in the community, where there is a direct link to the school, may also result in a suspension.

- Possessing or dispensing controlled or intoxicating substances that are not prescribed for medical purposes;
- Being under the influence of illegal, controlled or intoxicating substances that are not prescribed for medical purposes;
- Smoking on school property;
- Vandalism, destruction, damage to school property or to the property of others located on or in school premises;
- Stealing property;
- Intimidation, extortion, verbal aggression and bullying;
- Misuse or misappropriation of school property or services, including computers and other technology systems;
- Hate motivated incidents;
- Gang related activity;
- Possession of dangerous objects or substances, including for example laser pointers; gloves with studs on knuckles; or any other item deemed by the principal/viceprincipal to be unsafe or a hazard to persons or property in the school;
- Committing physical assault on another student;
- Engaging in or encouraging a fight;
- Conduct that constitutes opposition to authority;
- Poor attendance that warrants disciplinary action; Conduct that is disruptive to the conduct of the class or school;

- Engaging in conduct that is detrimental to the moral of the school;
- Clothing/apparel that is inappropriate, offensive or violates the school dress code;
- Engaging in unauthorized gambling of games of chance;
- Uttering a threat to inflict serious bodily harm;
- Possession of illegal drugs;
- Acts of vandalism causing extensive damage to school property or property located on school premises;
- Swearing at a teacher, or other person in authority;
- Being in possession of alcohol;
- Being under the influence of alcohol;
- Bill 2012 retains the requirement for principals to issue mandatory suspensions in response to specific situations. Specifically principals must suspend students who:
- Possess a weapon
- Use a weapon to threaten bodily harm
- Commit a physical assault
- Commit a sexual assault
- Traffic in weapons or illegal drugs
- Commit robbery
- Give alcohol to a minor

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES (Ontario Schools Code of Conduct)

The Durham District School Board and Westcreek Public School accept the provincial direction regarding individual roles and responsibilities. In addition to school staff, students and parents, other members of the public, who interact with members of the school community while present in or on school property or premises, have a responsibility to respect others in the school and to conduct themselves accordingly.

Principals, under the direction of their school board, take a leadership role in the daily operation of a school. They provide this leadership by:

- demonstrating care and commitment to academic excellence and a safe teaching and learning environment;
- holding everyone, under their authority, accountable for their behaviour and actions;
- communicating regularly and meaningfully with all members of their school community.

Teachers and School Staff, under the leadership of their principal, maintain order in the school and are expected to hold everyone to the highest standard of respectful and responsible behaviour. As role models, staff upholds these high standards when they:

- help students work to their full potential and develop their self-worth;
- communicate regularly and meaningfully with parents;
- maintain consistent standards of behaviour for all students;
- demonstrate respect for all students, staff and parents;
- prepare students for the full responsibilities of citizenship.

Students are to be treated with respect and dignity. In return, they must demonstrate respect for themselves, for others and for the responsibilities of citizenship through acceptable behaviour. Respect and responsibility are demonstrated when a student:

- comes to school prepared, on time and ready to learn;
- shows respect for themselves, others and for those in authority;
- refrains from bringing anything to school that may compromise the safety of others;
- follows the established rules and takes responsibility for his or her own actions.

Parents play an important role in the education of their children and have a responsibility to support the efforts of school staff in maintaining a safe and respectful learning environment for all students. Parents fulfill this responsibility when they:

- show an active interest in their child's school work and progress;
- communicate regularly with the school;
- help their child be neat, appropriately dressed and prepared for school;
- ensure that their child attends school regularly and on time;
- promptly report to the school their child's absence or late arrival;
- become familiar with the Code of Conduct and school rules;
- encourage and assist their child in following the rules of behaviour;
- assist school staff in dealing with discipline issues.

Police and Community Members are essential partners in making our schools and communities safer. Community members need to support and respect the rules of their local schools. Police investigate incidents in accordance with the protocol developed with the local school board. These protocols are based on a provincial model developed by the Ministry of the Solicitor General and the Ministry of Education.
